They have over 15,000 mini descriptions of hardware items - systems on their website, most with pictures. These include about 35 UNIVAC/Unisys entries. Many of these 35 entries give credit to Wikipedia as the information source. They have most of the 1100 series of processors and a few of the early defense processors listed, i.e. AN/USQ-17.
