Our guest speaker will be Lyall A. Schwarzkopf who will talk about the Damming of the Yangtze River in China. HEALTH ISSUES

Government Spending

Back on December 27th both USA Today and The Oregonian printed articles on government spending by the AP's Stephen Ohlemacher. According to the census.gov website, total federal spending to the states in 2004 was \$2,162,204 million (2 trillion, 162 billion), with per capita spending of \$7,223. This spending does not include out-of-country or classified (CIA, NSA, etc.) money. Minnesota got \$28.8 billion or \$5,644 per capita. Alaska got \$8.4 billion and had the highest at \$12,885 per capita; Nevada was lowest at \$5,469. Other states exceeding \$10,000 per capita were Maryland, New Mexico, and Virginia. North Dakota was close at \$9,513, with South Dakota, Montana, and Wyoming above \$8,000.

Nearly half of all 2004 federal money went to Social Security, Medicare, and Medicaid. Looking only at Medicare Part A and B payouts, Minnesota got \$3.9 billion for its 616,500 residents 65 and over (12.1% of the population). This means the Minnesota payout to Medicare enrollees averaged \$523 per month. The other states in our region ranged from \$522 to \$557.

Beyond our nine-state region, Medicare payout averages per enrollee were \$688 in Florida and \$936 in Louisiana. The website has data for individual counties; this is where the most flagrant distortions appear. Social Security payouts were mostly in the \$13,000 to \$15,000 range and included under 65 disability and survivor payouts along with retirement payouts. Similarly, Medicaid payouts were in the \$550-650 range averaged for the state populations. Please check the website to see how dependent we are for both jobs and government support of so many helpful programs we know little about.

Transform 2010

The state Departments of Human Services and Health introduced Transform 2010 the first week of January as a "project to prepare Minnesota for its Age Wave." The state has been reducing its number of nursing home beds to something closer to the national average. It also is seeing the percentage of families that provide long-term care to parents and relatives declining; in 1988, 97% had family care – in 2004, 91% received family care and the number is expected to continue down.

With 1.4 million boomers and \$1 billion forecast as the 2006 total for long-term care Medical Assistance, state planners are frightened that the cost will quickly become impossible for the state to afford if family support decreases significantly. Twenty-nine percent (534,000) of boomers are not expected to have resources for long-term care.

The Department of Health stresses a healthy aging framework that: 1) Addresses basic needs, 2) Optimizes health and well-being, 3) Promotes social engagement, and 4) and civic Supports independence for the elderly. This last category is where help for "aging in place" is identified. The primary support system concerns were transportation, caregiver support, evening/weekend care help, and chore help. Lesser concerns were inhome respite, and home modifications. Adequate support was available for meals and skilled nursing.

As part of the program, presenters gave demographic data for east and west metro counties that showed the percentage 65+ and 85+ was very low compared to the rest of the state, that the number of workers available to support the 65+ group was very high, that the number of available caregivers was very high, and that outside the inner cities the percent living alone was very low. As an example, Anoka County has only 7.1% 65+, while Traverse County has 26.2% 65 and older.

An earlier Department of Health presentation focused more on getting seniors to buy long-term care insurance in one form or another. This initiative seems to recognize that the seniors most in need of care are also likely to be those least able to afford any of the insurance options.

Odd Shots

The January 14th Star Tribune editorial finally uses my favorite words in describing Medicare Part D – "…absolutely appalling…."

At the January MJC meeting, we heard that the Congress will not be voting to restore the 4.6% Medicare reimbursement cut until February and probably will not provide a 1% increase the medical associations had lobbied to add. We also were told that the FDA and Customs were more aggressively seizing prescriptions sent from Canadian pharmacies to individuals – confiscation with no right to reclaim. We do have something to be thankful for; Minnesota is among the few states with decent Medicaid databases and our low-income dual eligible's can be found; many states have no idea what their Medicare population is qualified to receive. What isn't being talked about is the toll the whole Part D problem is taking on pharmacists and counselors to get people drugs and keep them out of programs that do not give the best option. The Senior Fed has added 10 staff and 5 VISTA aids through the Access to Benefits Coalition and CMS Commissioner McClellan continues to say the situation is good and getting better.

Finally, Sen. Durenberger's January 9th commentary says, "the tragic truth is that the health system is making too much money and demanding more, while consumers, employers and taxpayers are looking at going bankrupt or bare." Neil McLaughlin, the managing editor of Modern Healthcare says of pay-for performance, "Giving someone more money to do what professional standards say he or she should have done all along strikes me as a little funny."

Directions to Eagan Community Center. Take Hwy 35E south or north to Pilot Knob Road. Turn left (north) on Pilot Knob Road. Turn left on Central Parkway (which is also the North entrance to Lockheed). The Eagan Community Center is at 1501 Central Parkway.

Directions to Unisys in Roseville. Take Hwy 35W south, or north, to the Industrial Way / St. Anthony Blvd off ramp. If coming north or south on Hwy 35E go west on Hwy 36 which will take you to the Industrial Way / St. Anthony Blvd. off ramp of 35W (Hwy 36 becomes Hwy 35W where it joins Hwy 35W). Go north on St. Anthony Blvd. to Walnut St. (the first street on the right). Turn right and go to Highcrest which is the first place where you can turn left. Past the stop sign. Bldg 3 is on the right. Gate 5 is in the center of the building.

From Hwy 280 northbound, use left lane exit just past Cty Rd B for Terminal road access (St Croix St.). Turn left at Terminal Rd, then turn right at Highcrest Rd to building entrance.
