If you want to conserve wild nature, just buy it up and take control over it. In fact, that's basically how the Nature Conservancy got its start in the 50s and 60s, and today it owns over two million acres of land in the U.S. Its mission however, as Ted Olson will explain on February 11th, has evolved over the last five decades into a multidimensional approach still aimed at the protection of natural places. Ted will cite specific local, national and international examples of the Conservancy's successful work. In his words "TNC unites the highest scientific talent and the most powerful market mechanisms with the passions of environmentalism to create a disciplined, collaborative and results-oriented organization. Please join us to learn how the pragmatic inclusion of all stakeholders – private citizens, landowners, public corporations, government and academia - results in the effective protection of natural places of eye-popping beauty to the lasting benefit of people, the landscape and its wild inhabitants "

Ted Olson, 49, joined The Nature Conservancy in 2007 after a 23-year career in software sales and business development with Microsoft and other firms. He has responsibility for the Conservancy's relationships with corporate and private entities and their activities together around the world. Privately Olson leads canoe and backpack adventures in places as close as the North Shore and as far as Iceland.

consciousness of all Minnesotans, beginning about a half century ago and continuing today. Our speaker for March 11<sup>th</sup> will be media man Jim Klobuchar (who probably will not be able to resist mentioning his daughters Amy and Meagan), and his subject will be "The Most Amazing Capitalists in the World." His story will be primarily about the millions of ambitious poor people who are being lifted out of poverty by the worldwide movement called microfinance or micro credit. The model for it was created by Muhammad Yunus, an economist from Bangladesh who was awarded the 2006 Nobel Peace Prize. The system works, and is functioning on four continents. Almost incredibly, the repayment rate on these microloans, documented, is 97 per cent, around the world. Jim will also reflect on his 50 years in daily journalism, column writing and authorship, including mountain climbing and pro football.

Jim is a native of Ely, Minnesota and a longtime figure in Minnesota journalism. He retired several years ago after 45 years in daily news papering, radio and television but has no plans to retire from writing and adventure. He has just published his 22nd book, "Pieces of My Heart," and he remains active in the outdoors as the president of Jim Klobuchar's Adventures, which has taken thousands of people to the faraway places. He was nominated by the Christian Science Monitor for the 2003 Pulitzer Prize in journalism, and he was also a finalist in NASA's journalist-in-space program before the project was put on hold because of a shuttle accident. Notably he danced a tango in the middle of the Nicollet Mall with the late Ginger Rogers and also notably survived a near fistfight with the late Viking football coach, Norm Van Brocklin. He says the scuffle with Van Brocklin and the tango with Ginger were equally hazardous, but he didn't need a tourniquet after dancing with Ginger.

# LEGACY NEWS UPDATE

### THE ICING ON THE CAKE

As a direct result of our efforts to support the 2008 Minnesota Sesquicentennial Celebration, the Legacy team received a special request in early December from the Sesquicentennial Commission. We were asked to provide suggestions for items to be included in a special "Time Capsule" that would be "buried" for 50 years and then opened for the 2058 Minnesota Bicentennial. Of course we could not cover all interest areas for all Minnesotans, but we could certainly provide artifacts and documents that were of significance to the origin and development of the computer industry here. From our experience with Legacy we felt very qualified to make suggestions and provide the items on relatively short notice. The capsule 'seal' date was January 6<sup>th</sup>, 2009 at which time there would be the final official event of the year long Sesquicentennial Celebration. This event, now history, consisted of Sesquicentennial entertainment. gratis distribution of remaining Sesquicentennial memorabilia, various speeches of significant Sesquicentennial Commission staff and state government officials, expressions of gratitude to all volunteers, and then capped off by the ceremonial sealing of the time capsule. VIP Club members Tom Turba, Dick Lundgren, and Lowell Benson attended the event with three young grandsons who should be able to recall it in 2058.

The short list of items which we submitted for inclusion is as follows: First is a letter to the 2058 Bicentennial Commission describing who we are, what our role was in the Sesquicentennial, and what items we have included in the time capsule. Secondly, we provided samples of computer hardware from vintages ca. 1958 and 2008. The 1958 PC card was a 15-pin, four transistor (4 gates) module such as was used in the 642A NTDS shipboard computer. By comparison, the 2008 module was an ASIC (Application Specific Integrated Circuit) with 14 million gates and 65 contacts in about the same physical volume. The ASIC was used in the Unisys 2008 Clear Path and ES-7000 systems. Thirdly, we provided copies of documents (including photos) which were significant to our company legacy as well as to the Charles Babbage Institute. We provided them in both hard copy and in electronic form, the latter being a memory stick with a USB connector. Who knows if that will be readable in 50 years? One document included is the chart of our company's evolution from ERA in 1946 along with the myriad spin-off companies. This chart, in large size, was one of our background wall boards used in our Sesquicentennial display. Another document is a 2001 issue of the IEEE "Annals of the History of Computing" in which the role of Erwin Tomash in establishing the Charles Babbage Institute is described. Erwin Tomash, an early ERA engineer, was the primary founder of the Charles Babbage Institute and the establishment of its "ERA Land-Grant Chair in the History of Technology" at the University of Minnesota. And lastly we provided a copy of futurist Brian Toren's 2008 look into the future for computers and their applications. Brian's presentation was given on stage in our public forum in the Sesquicentennial tent during the The complete story of our 2008 MN State Fair. Sesquicentennial involvement including the time capsule inclusions is posted to the VIP Club web site as the February 'Article of the Month' (vipclubmn.org).

An additional series of articles, called "On the Edge of the Digital Age," was also included in the capsule. This future-looking series, although not part of our own Legacy effort, had been published in the Minneapolis Star Tribune, and it did make reference to our early history. If we are on the "edge" of the digital age now, where will we be in 50 years?

### CBI FEATURED "UNIVAC-TO-UNISYS" AND HONEYWELL IN ITS LATEST TALKS

The Charles Babbage Institute at the University of Minnesota continued its series of talks on "Minnesota's Hidden History in Computing" with lectures on the Univac-to-Unisys period and on Honeywell's Computer efforts. On December 17th, Dr. Tom Misa, director of CBI, presented an interesting talk entitled "The Legacies of Univac." He examined the legacies of the Twin Cities' Univac Division of Sperry-Rand including the super-reliable computers for the U.S. Navy, direct follow-on business in automating U.S. terminal air experiments in traffic control, early real-time networking, and the transitioning to create today's Unisys corporation.

On January 21<sup>st</sup>, Dr. Misa presented "Partnerships and Patents: Honeywell and the Computer Industry." He examined how Honeywell, even though they didn't survive as a major player in the computer industry, came to shape the computer industry through its own computer innovations, its corporate partnerships, and its foray in the patent courts that successfully contested the landmark ENIAC patent.

It should be noted that this series of talks is already drawing attendees from the employee/retiree ranks of CDC, Honeywell, various U of M departments, and many others. **Directions to Eagan Community Center**. Take Hwy 35E south or north to Pilot Knob Road. Turn left (north) on Pilot Knob Road. Turn left on Central Parkway (which is also the North entrance to Lockheed). The Eagan Community Center is at 1501 Central Parkway.

**Directions to Unisys in Roseville**. Take Hwy 35W south, or north, to the Industrial Way / St. Anthony Blvd off ramp. If coming north or south on Hwy 35E go west on Hwy 36 which will take you to the Industrial Way / St. Anthony Blvd. off ramp of 35W (Hwy 36 becomes Hwy 35W where it joins Hwy 35W). Go north on St. Anthony Blvd. to Walnut St. (the first street on the right). Turn right and go to Highcrest Road. It is the first place where you can turn left. Past the stop sign, Bldg 3 is on the right. Gate 5 is in the center of the building. From Hwy 280 northbound, use left lane exit just past Cty Rd B for Terminal road access (St Croix St.). Turn left at Terminal Rd, then turn right at Highcrest Rd to building entrance.
