Currently, the equipment move is approximately 80% complete and projected to conclude in July 2025. The Unisys team has done fantastic work to adhere to the project schedule and has been wellorganized to facilitate a smooth transition to the new data center facility. Fifteen Unisys associates are assigned to an office suite in the Woodbury data center

facility as their permanent work location. These associates perform hands-on services of the computer systems to keep them up and running.

The remaining Unisys associates in the Pilot Knob Road office in Eagan, MN have consolidated into the northwest section on the main floor of the building. The new Unisys Chief Operating Officer, Chris Arrasmith, recently visited the Eagan office and acknowledged the valuable historical information contained in those displays."

YOUR STORY

International VIP Club Member Pierre Iskos

Keith Myhre shares his story of Pierre Iskos, a former coworker and friend he caught up with while in Greece last year.

As of December 2024, the VIP Club had five international members: three in Canada and one each in Germany and Greece. Last October, I flew into Athens for the start of an Aegean cruise to Istanbul. While in Athens, I got together with one of them: Pierre Iskos. It had been 13 years since I last saw Pierre. Both times, Pierre picked us up at our hotel and drove us to the southern tip of Attica to visit the Temple of Poseidon on Cape Sounion (Temple of Poseidon). This time it took a bit longer since Pierre hadn't driven this route since my last visit. A lot of new construction and road changes resulted in some wrong turns.

After returning to Athens, Pierre treated us to lunch

near his home in Papagou (Athens suburb). He then drove us past his home, which is in a state of construction. He had his previous home torn down, and a new home is being built in its place. There are four stories: one for each of his two sons and two daughters and their families.

Pierre Iskos emigrated from Greece when he was 17, got his electrical engineering degree from the University of Illinois in 1964, and became a U.S. citizen.

The Field Engineering Department of Sperry UNIVAC Defense Systems hired Pierre in February 1965 to support the Apollo space program that was just beginning. He started working with design engineers Bob Oulicky and Don Mager doing design testing of the new 1230 computer which was designed for the Apollo Project (https://vipclubmn.org/CP30bit.html#Type1230).


In October 1965 he was sent to Goddard Space Flight Center with several other field engineers to provide technical support to NASA personnel on the Apollo space program, as well as to the 100⁺ UNIVAC

on-site programmers. Six months later he was promoted to site supervisor, a position he held until a transfer to Germany in December 1971 to provide technical support to the German Navy and the UNIVAC programming team at the Wilhelmshaven Naval Base, working on development of the Fast Patrol Boat system. He stayed there for nine months, then moved to Bonn/Bad Gödesberg, where he provided systems engineering support to marketing and led marketing initiatives for southern Europe and the Middle East.

In 1976, Sperry UNIVAC won a contract with the Greek Navy for the *Kanaris* submarine fire control system. Pierre was sent to Greece to be the in-country marketing rep for Greece and the Middle East.

In 1994, 18 years later, the company brought Pierre back to St. Paul to work with various marketing teams before being laid off in March of 1996, whereupon he and his family moved to Greece (see <u>Pierre Iskos Career Summary</u>).

Pierre is doing well at age 88. He said he does sit-ups and push-ups every morning and walks every day. He is still driving, but thinks this may be his last year since he has to requalify for his driver's license next year. As usual, Pierre asked



lots of questions about his UNIVAC friends and the status of the "company" in MN. And, he had a number of stories about his days at UNIVAC, especially as a field engineer on Apollo missions.

peacefully February 25, 2025. Dennis graduated with an electrical engineering degree from the U of MN. As a freshman walk-on, he made the varsity baseball team but quickly discovered there weren't enough hours to play baseball

and study engineering. Dennis worked as an electrical engineer and manager for Sperry/Unisys/Lockheed Martin for 34 years, where he received numerous awards of excellence, including three patents. He helped design hardware for the Navy, including ship-based missile and torpedo tracking systems; worked on an Air Force project to create flight data recorders, now used in all commercial aircraft; and worked on Stealth Bomber hardware and spent time at Skunk Works in California when the plane was just a plywood prototype. Dennis vibration-dampening constantly developing systems to hold the electronics because of challenging environments. He developed an early solid-state memory, called bubble memory (https://vipclubmn.org/ Memory.html#Bubbles), which is like today's USB thumb drive but 40 years earlier. Dennis enjoyed sharing his outdoorsman passion, teaching his sons to crosscountry ski; camping in their pop-up camper; fishing with family, friends, and coworkers; and often making a family pilgrimage to their favorite Reed Lake spot. Dennis also had passions for photography and woodworking; enjoyed hunting, golf, playing bridge; the Twins, Timberwolves, and Vikings; and time with family. Dennis is survived by his loving wife of 60 years, Mary, his two sons, and other family and friends.

Glen Eldon Bonde — Age 81 of Ham Lake, MN passed



away March 8, 2025. A coworker remembers Glen as "one of the good guys, with an appreciated 'open door policy' to anyone wanting to talk. It didn't matter what position one had in the company; he was available to all."
